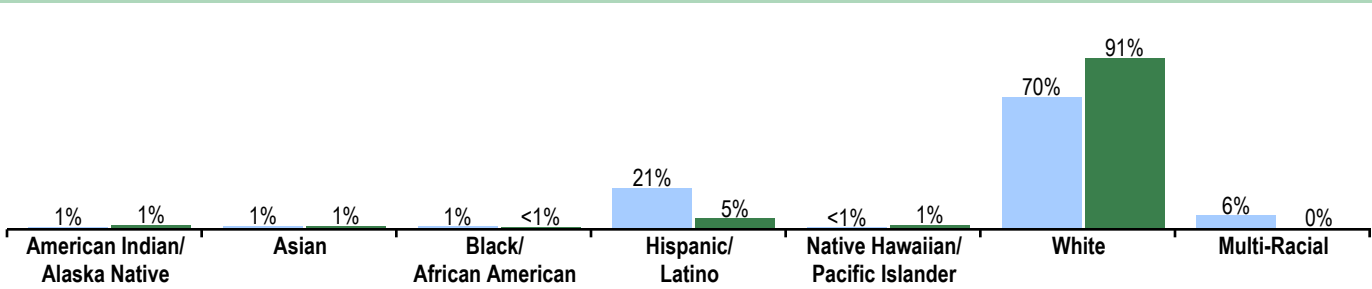

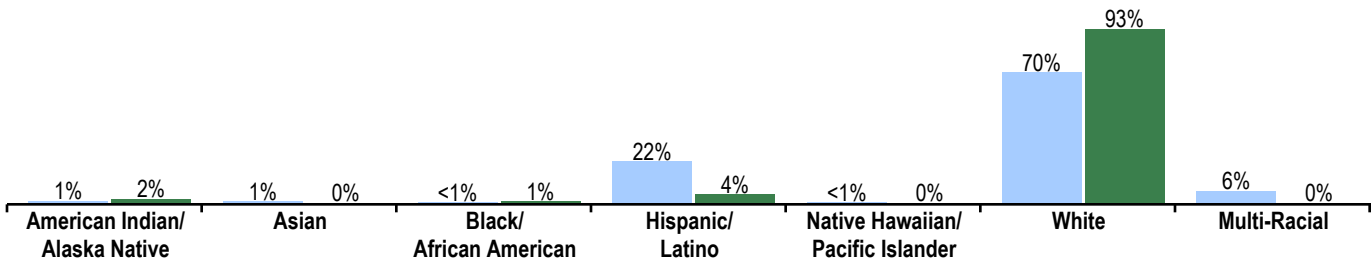
RACE/ETHNICITY OF STUDENTS AND STAFF 2015-16

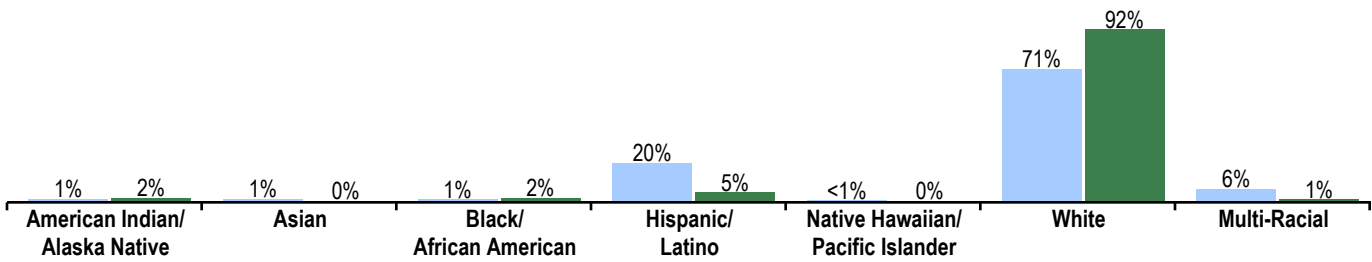
Grades K-3



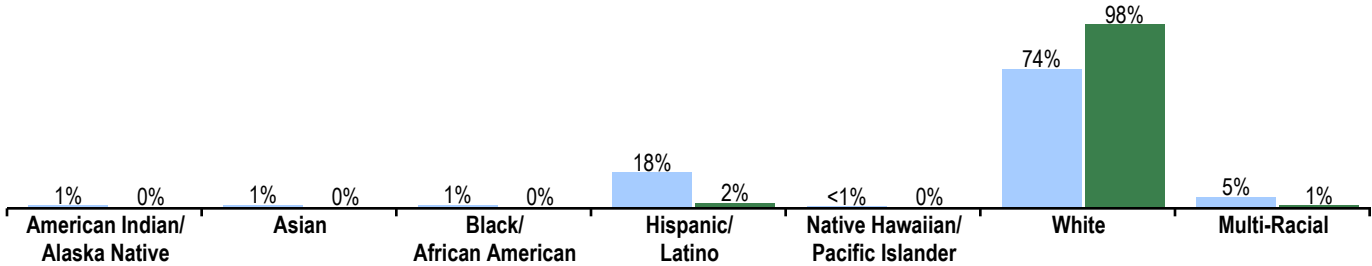
Grades 4-5
